

Rowley project list: Pillows for a Girl's Room

Pillows are an easy way to add color, texture and fun to any girl's bed. To go beyond standard pillows into the realm of a young girl's dreams, we're adding design details: double ruffles and corner gathers. This project list will take you through fabrication of ruffled pillow shams, gathered-corner pillows and a fun, frilled bolster.

PILLOWS FOR A GIRL'S ROOM: STEP-BY-STEP INSTRUCTIONS

Pillows can be closed using a number of methods: Zippers, hand sewing, buttons, hook & loop, etc. In this project we used hand closing and an invisible zipper. The pillow shams finish at 26" x 26", the square pillows finish at 16" x 16" and the bolster finishes at 44" x 9".

Double Ruffle Pillow Shams

Preparing the Pieces

- Cut the front of the sham to 27" x 27".
 - Iron a layer of Iron-On Batting to the back of the front of each piece.

The back will be made up of two pieces: the top and the bottom.

- **A.** Cut the top 6" shorter than the front piece.
- **B.** Cut the bottom, matching patterns, 6" x 27", plus 3" more on the top and bottom for pattern matching.










Place the top on top of the bottom fabric, overlapping the extra amount.

Draw a line across the bottom where the top stops. Cut the bottom on that line.











Insert the invisible zipper according to the **product instructions**.





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Lay the front face down on the back prepared piece, matching tops, and trim as needed to the correct size.

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Making & Sewing the Double Ruffle

- 1 Cut and make enough welt cord to go around the front of both shams, plus enough for joining.
- Cut the first (largest) layer of ruffle at 7"W x 2.5 times the diameter of the sham.
- Cut the second (smallest) layer of ruffle at 4" x 2.5 times the diameter of the sham.
- **4** Join the first layer pieces to form a circle. Do the same to the second layer fabric.
 - Fold the circles in half lengthwise and iron to set a fold crease.







At the machine, place the smaller layer on top of the larger layer, matching raw edges and stitch within the seam allowance to join them into one large, double-layered circle.







Finishing the Sham



Cut and make enough welt cord to go around the front pieces + enough for joins.



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Glue-baste the welt to the front. Sew welt to the front pieces making the joins at the machine.







Measure and place a pin at the quarters of the prepared ruffle. Place the pins at the corners of the sham front.

Working in halves, find the halfway of a side and pin it halfway along the side, pinning the ruffle to the front.

Keep halving until your pins are about 3" apart.

Complete all four sides.

Sew the ruffle to the front, gathering fabric between pins.

A. Be sure to gather tighter at the corners so gathers will be even along all sides once the sham is turned right sides out.







Tuck the ruffle into the face, place the back on the front, right sides together, and sew the sham.

Turn right sides out through the zipper area and stuff. Close the zipper.



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FABRICATION







Gathered Corner Pillow



Cut the front and back at 17" x17".

Iron on a layer of Iron-On Batting to the front and back pieces.




- Cut and make enough welt cord to go around the pillow 2 times. You need to use a foot one size larger so that the casing is very loose. You will be tightening it up as you gather and sew.
- Do not glue-baste the welt to the pillow you will need to have easy access to the welt as you are sewing it down.
- On the back of one piece, mark in 4" from each corner. This is the area where you will be gathering the welt cord.



Apply the welt to the pillow using the correct foot size.

- Start sewing the welt on a flat area. When you get to the marks, gather the welt fabric and sew it down, continuing with the gathers until you reach the second corner mark.
- Continue around all corners until you have the welt completely sewn on. Trim seam allowances as needed.







Place the front and the back pieces right side together.



Sew around the outside joining the two pieces, leaving an area open for turning.





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Turn right sides out, stuff and close using your preferred method.



Long Bolster

Preparing the Pieces



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For the base piece, either cut a piece of fabric 45" x 29 ¼" or manipulate your fabric pieces until you come out with the same size.

Cut the center frame piece 2" wider than your plan x 29 ¼". Iron under a 1" side seam on both long sides.





Cut the two end circles at 10".

Cut and make enough welt cord to go around the two end circles plus enough for joins.

Sew the welt to the circles, making the join as you sew.

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Mark the circles in quarters.





Cut <u>2 pieces</u> of ruffle fabric 7"W x about 60"L. Fold it in half lengthwise and sew along the long sides and one short side to make a long tube. Turn it right sides out and cut off the short sewn end. Refold the tube so the seam is on the center bottom.



Making the Pillow



Place the center field fabric right sides up in the center of the base fabric. Pin in place.



Top stitch the center field fabric to the base along the sides. The seam will be hidden later.









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Pin the ruffle ends to cover the top stitching, making sure the seam is on the center bottom.

Using the halving technique, keep pinning halves until your pins are about 3" apart.







At the machine, sew the ruffle to the base, gathering between pins as you go. Sew a double row about 1/4" apart being sure to capture the seam of the ruffle.







Finishing the Pillow

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Fold the fabric right sides together, lengthwise.




Sew a few inches down the long side at the top and at the bottom only.









Match the ¼ markings on the base to the ¼ markings on the round ends. Pin in place and sew.

Turn right sides out, stuff and close using your preferred method.







Add decorative beads or buttons, evenly spaced, along the double stitching of the ruffle.
